ANTHONY AND FIONNUALA ARDEE

Fionnuala and Anthony are the co-owners of Killruddery, Ireland. Together, over the past 15 years, they have transformed the estate into a vibrant cultural destination known for its award-winning farm-to-fork restaurant, weddings, corporate entertainment and a diverse events programme and sustainable practices.

Fionnuala, CEO with a Fine Arts degree from NCAD and a diploma in Arts in the Community, has curated a rich program of events since 2009, including a silent film festival, children's arts festivals, concerts, talks and creative workshops. Her vision blends artistry with community engagement. Her background in restaurants and growing, informs her passion for Killruddery's renowned culinary offerings.



Anthony, with a deep connection to the land, oversees the estate's regenerative farming efforts and sustainability initiatives. He leads the farm-to-fork restaurant and take-out offerings, ensuring that the estate's produce is at the heart of its culinary experiences. Anthony also works alongside Fionnuala to maintain Killruddery's gardens and farmlands, supporting a wide array of cultural programs and ensuring the estate remains a thriving hub for both cultural and environmental innovation.



VALERIO TEMPERINI

Associate Professor of Business Economics and Management at the Polytechnic University of Marche. He is the director of CRISMAT (Interdepartmental Research Center on the Third Sector). Temperini also serves as the university's representative on the Board of Directors of the Monte Conero Regional Park.

Venues Auditorium Neroni

The Auditorium Emidio Neroni is located in the beautiful historic centre of the municipality of Ascoli Piceno. The building, belonging to the Fondazione Carisap, is obtained in the spaces of the former churches of San Giovanni ad Templum and San Francesco di Paola specially purchased and fully restored by the Cassa di Risparmio di Ascoli Piceno. The Auditorium, resulting from the aggregation of two churches built at different times and in different styles, lacks homogeneity and architectural unity. However, the vicissitudes of the two buildings, which have always been joined, have been permanently coinciding and interdependent.

This space is generally made available for the organisation of recreational and cultural activities.



Venues Palazzo Saladini di Rovetino

In the historical centre of Ascoli Piceno, Palazzo Saladini di Rovetino stands at the intersection of Piazza Sant'Agostino and the ancient Via delle Torri.

The residence was built from the end of the 17th century and completed in 1719, a date that attests to the end of the work and the completion of the frescoes. It has a total of 96 rooms and what is called the Gallery of Mirrors, where the 18th-century frescoes by Ascoli painter Biagio Miniera are displayed in all their beauty.

The restoration of Palazzo Saladini was entrusted to architect Carlo Maria Saladini, part of the family that owns it. He normally lives in the Palazzo, amongst his fondest childhood memories.



Venues Civic Picture Gallery

Officially established in 1861 thanks to two artists from Ascoli, Giorgio Paci (1820–1914) and Giulio Gabrielli (1832–1910), the conspicuous artistic collection, with over 800 objects still on display, is housed *ab antiquo* in the imposing Palazzo dell'Arengo. The two first fitters drew works from the picture galleries of the monasteries of Sant'Angelo Magno, San Domenico and the Jesuits.

Among the precious works kept, the most important are the 13th century cope, of English manufacture, donated in 1288 to the Cathedral of Ascoli by Pope Nicholas IV, paintings by Carlo Crivelli, Cola dell'Amatrice, Titian, Guido Reni, Strozzi, De Ferrari, Magnasco, Mancini, Morelli, Palizzi and Pellizza da Volpedo. The works are set in splendid rooms furnished with rare consolles, armchairs, mirrors and chests of drawers from the 18th and 19th centuries, which, with their precious curtains and Murano chandeliers, recreate the atmosphere and charm of an aristocratic palace.
